Moreover, you can use text in a preferred font, size, stretch and color, selecting any location you like and applying it onto the image. The 'Canvas' section enables you to alter the 'Texture Properties' as well as the 'Texture Application Parameters', namely the 'Brightness', 'Embossing' and 'Distortion', along with the light orientation.
